

Even prior to independence in 1947, India used the inland letter sheet as an economical format for in-country correspondence. These sheets exist with and without pre-printed postal indicia.

Sheets with the printed notation O.I.G.S. – On Indian Government Service – were typically produced without postal indicia because official mail was sent post free. At least as early as 1965, however, malaria messages were pre-printed on a number of sheets produced for official use. These sheets, then, are forerunners to the later sheets with pre-printed postal indicia and malaria-related messages.

The following are examples of such sheets with messages urging people to take chloroquine tablets to cure and prevent malaria, a serious problem in the country.


